ACCEPTABLE FORMS OF PROOF OF HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION

This section is divided into three "tiers." All tiers are acceptable forms of proof of high school graduation. Each tier has a separate expected timeline for completion and builds upon the previous tier. Most students may complete only Tier Two and Tier Three listed below.

Tier One

1. International General Certificate of Secondary Education (IGCSE) [Must pass five or more IGCSE examinations in separate subjects to qualify as an acceptable form of proof of high school graduation]

Expected Timeline of Completion	11 years (three years or six semesters from the initial start of year nine)	
Issuing Body	Various examination boards	
First Available Date of Issue (Typical)	August	

Tier Two

The expected timeline for completion of all Tier Two acceptable forms of proof of high school graduation is upon successful on-time completion of year 12. Earning a Tier Two acceptable form of proof of high school graduation will advance the expected date of high school graduation **one year** from the on-time expected timeline of a Tier One document.

1. National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA) Level 2 (either in the form of a certificate or the New Zealand Record of Achievement showing Level 2 achieved, under the 'Qualification and Achievement Summary' section)

Expected Timeline of Completion	12 years (Four years or eight semesters from the initial start of year nine)	
Issuing Body	New Zealand Qualifications Authority	
First Available Date of Issue (Typical)	January	

Tier Three

The expected timeline for completion of all Tier Three acceptable forms of proof of high school graduation is upon successful on-time completion of year 13. Earning a Tier Three acceptable form of proof of high school graduation will advance the expected date of high school graduation **one year** from the on-time expected timeline of a Tier Two document, or **two years** beyond the on-time completion of a Tier One document.

1. National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA) Level 3 (either in the form of a certificate or the New Zealand Record of Achievement showing Level 3 achieved, under the 'Qualification and Achievement Summary' section)

Expected Timeline of Completion	13 years (Five years or 10 semesters from the initial start of year nine)	
Issuing Body	New Zealand Qualifications Authority	
First Available Date of Issue (Typical)	January

 - ° Added only from the New Zealand Record of Achievement and not from school-issued transcripts.
 - ^o Analyzed using the course heading as the title, and the grades and credit should come from the smaller units awarded under each eligible course heading.
 - ^o When evaluating the New Zealand Record of Achievement for core courses and credit, it is acceptable to award over 1.0 units of credit to a course heading if the individual units listed below the heading total to more than 1.0 credit, based on New Zealand's country-specific crediting policy.
