- 2001** A Women's Frozen Four is held for the first time as Minn. Duluth defeats St. Lawrence, 4-2, in Minneapolis to take home the first crown.
- 2002** Minn. Duluth wins its second straight Women's Frozen Four, 3-2, over Brown.
- 2003** Minn. Duluth wins the Women's Frozen Four, its third consecutive, in front of a record crowd of 5,167, in its home arena.
- 2004** Minnesota outscores its two opponents, 11-3, to dominate the Women's Frozen Four in Providence, R.I. The Golden Gophers beat Harvard, 6-2, in the championship game.
- 2005** The field expands to eight teams with Mercyhurst, Providence and Wisconsin all making their first appearances. Minnesota wins its second straight title.
- 2006** Wisconsin claims its first Women's Frozen Four title in Minneapolis after defeating Minnesota, the two-time defending national champion. The Badgers become the first team in tournament history other than the Golden Gophers or Minn. Duluth to win the championship.
- 2007** The Frozen Four is held in historic Lake Placid, N.Y., where the 1980 Olympic Games took place. Wisconsin successfully defends its title, defeating Minn. Duluth, 4-1, in the championship game.
- 2008** Minn. Duluth captures its fourth national championship with a 4-0 shutout of Wisconsin in the final to avenge a loss to the Badgers in the 2007 championship game.
- 2009** Wisconsin rides the most prolific offense in the history of the NCAA women's ice hockey tournament to its third NCAA title, shutting out Mercyhurst, 5-0, in the championship. Mercyhurst becomes the first No. 3 seed to reach the title contest.
- 2010** Minn. Duluth outlasts tournament newcomer Cornell in the longest championship game in NCAA tournament history, capturing its fifth national title with a 3-2 triple-overtime victory. Cornell is the first team to reach the title game in its initial NCAA tournament appearance since Brown in 2002.
- 2011** After missing the tournament in 2010, Wisconsin rebounds to win its second national championship in three years, defeating Boston U. in the title game. It was the fourth championship overall for the Badgers.

- 2012** Minnesota won its third championship and first since 2005, defeating defending champion and top-seeded Wisconsin in the final, 4-2. It was the first time in tournament history that the top seed had lost in the championship game. Wisconsin's Hilary Knight became the tournament's all-time leader in goals and points scored. Cornell's 8-7 triple-overtime win over Boston U. in the quarterfinals was the highest-scoring game in tournament history.
- 2013** Minnesota completed the first undefeated season in NCAA history at 41-0 with a 6-3 victory against Boston U. in the championship game in its home rink.
- 2014** Clarkson becomes the first team from the East, and just fourth different team overall, to win the NCAA title, with a 5-4 win against Minnesota at Quinipiac.
- 2015** Minnesota wins its record-tying fifth title on its home ice in front of a sellout crowd, 4-1 against Harvard.
- 2016** Minnesota defended its NCAA crown and won for a record-setting sixth time in part thanks to the return of USA Olympian Amanda Kessel.
- 2017** The tournament featured shut outs in five of the seven tournament games, including the national championship game, which saw Clarkson wins its second NCAA title, 3-0 against Wisconsin in St. Charles, Mo.
- 2018** Clarkson needed overtime in all three of its tournament contests, including a 2-1 win over Colgate, to win the NCAA title.
- 2019** Wisconsin became the first team in tournament history to shut out all three of its opponents en route to the NCAA title.

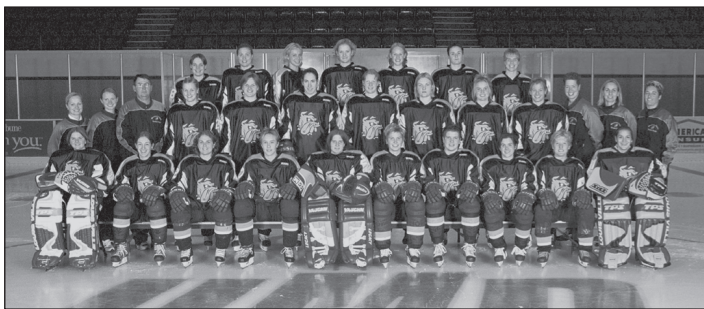
